For example, one of the main themes revolves around masculinity; while many men consider themselves to be strong and independent, Sparks reveals how fragile these notions can be. the psychoanalytic school (1875). His writings discussed Freudian therapy methods and included concepts from Freud himself (Sehandi, 2014). The novel, a form of writing, stands out as a literary composition with many facets worthy of close examination. The people, their traits, the plot, the time and place, and so on are the foundation. Because of this, the researcher is more likely to select a novel as the focus of their study. The researcher's attention was piqued by a Nicholas Sparks novel. He used his vivid imagination to transport readers into the worlds of his works. It was difficult to foresee, and sometimes tragic, how his stories would finish. (Miller, 2007:52)

Dawson Cole is the protagonist of this novel. As a native Californian, Dawson was born in the city of Oriental City. It turns out he belonged to the notoriously lawless Cole family. His loved ones were also surrounded by a thorny issue. His relative and even his father were cruel to him throughout his life. He finally got sick of living with his family and moved out. He unexpectedly became acquainted with Dr. Bonner's loved ones, who would ultimately have a profound impact on his own future. After Tuck Hostler died, Dawson was asked to meet with the deceased's lawyer to discuss a legal matter. Dawson's trouble sprang from an internal struggle between his feelings and his rational thinking. A personality disorder was also identified. Dawson's life was altered forever after that, and he was left with profound regrets over the person he had once loved. The protagonist of The Best of Me is a middle-aged woman who is vulnerable to the effects of any number of personality disorders. Repressed emotions are a major contributor to personality disorders. According to the researcher's chosen theory of suppression, this is important information. Therefore, the researcher hopes to use Sigmund Freud's notion of repression as a defense mechanism to study the novel. (Boeree, 2008:29)

In The Best of Me, Dawson Cole is a man who has been dealing with BPD (borderline personality

disorder) for most of his life. Initially, the condition presents as explosive and self-destructive behavior. However, over time Dawson learns how to manage his emotions and understand why he behaves in ways that are harmful to himself and those around him. He also finds support from people like Dr Nicole Browning, who helps him learn techniques such as Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT). DBT is a type of therapy that focuses on challenging negative thoughts while also providing support and positive reinforcement. This allows people with BPD to better identify and avoid patterns of destructive thinking. (Ibid:78)

## 2. ANALYSIS OF THE NICHOLAS SPARKS NOVEL 'THE BEST OF ME'

The researcher divided this analysis into three parts. In the first section, the researcher provides details on the borderline personality disorder reasons that were identified in the book. In the second portion, the researcher provides details on the effects of borderline personality disorder, which were identified in the book. The researcher concludes by discussing Dawson Cole's, the novel's main character, struggle with borderline personality disorder and eventual recovery.

2.1. The Cause of Borderline Personality Disorder in Dawson Cole

The narrative of Nicholas Sparks' book The Best of Me revolves around Dawson Cole, the main character, who suffers from borderline personality disorder. The American Psychiatric Association describes it as having impulsive behaviour, unstable emotions, and interpersonal interactions. Childhood traumatising events may be related to borderline personality disorder (Pedneault, 2019). In this section, the researcher will discuss the causes of borderline personality disorder. The majority of mental health practitioners concur that both individual and environmental factors play a role in its development. (Pedneault, 2019:32).

#### 2.1.1. Environmental Causes

Any personality problem, but particularly Borderline Personality Disorder, might increase a person's risk of experiencing trauma. It might not be able to handle stress or worry in the future if it has not been treated properly. Childhood experiences are one environmental component that contributes to borderline personality disorder. It can be a discrediting emotional change that hasn't always occurred to people who have gone through it. It can, however, be suppressed, hidden, or even pretended to be praise. It is linked to physical or sexual abuse, young caregiver separation, emotional or physical neglect, and insensitive parenting (Pedneault, 2019:48).

#### 2.1.2. Physical or Sexual Abuse

Physical or sexual abuse is the first environmental factor. In contrast, Dawson Cole in the book only encountered physical assault. The author demonstrated this in the narration below:

"Aunts and uncles started to notice that he alone among the cousins was abiding by the rules; one of his teachers reported to a drinking mate of his dad that he was the finest student in his class. He was different in a family that placed the highest value on fidelity and conformity, and there was no greater sin.

He enraged his father about it. Although his father used belts and straps to beat him frequently starting when he was a child, the beatings started to feel personal by the time he was twelve. After beating Dawson until his back and chest were black and blue, his father would leave for an hour before coming back and focusing on the boy's face and legs. (p.13)"

It happened when Dawson Cole's teacher told one of Dawson's dad's drinking buddies that he was the class's top student. Since then, his aunts and uncles have come to understand that he is unique from his relatives. He was the one who followed the law's guidelines. However, Cole's family values family loyalty and obedience more than anything else. They therefore contend that since he was unique within his family, this is the worst fault. The teacher's comments enraged Dawson's father. Even though Dawson's father had been beating him since he was a kid, this rendered Dawson a victim of fatherly abuse.

Furthermore, he had two cousins who had also physically abused him in addition to his father, thus the violence did not stop with his father. The narration below stated:

"His elder cousins, Abee and Crazy Ted, repeatedly jumped him and beat him as badly as his father did. Abee did it because he believed Dawson had it coming, and Crazy Ted did it for fun. Abee was angry and short-tempered but intelligent than he let on. He was large and broad with fists the size of ham bones. On the other hand, Crazy Ted was nasty from birth. (p.14)"

The older cousins of Dawson are Abee and Crazy Ted. They have fought him numerous times, beating him up like his father. Because of their culture and Cole's family history, they are able to beat each other up effortlessly. Abee is angry and short-tempered, tall, and his fists are the size of ham bones. Crazy Ted, on the other hand, was designed from birth to live a life of crime. Dawson did not come to them as Abee had anticipated, and Crazy Ted was simply doing what he wanted to do to Dawson. Due to the way his family treated him, he experienced physical abuse to a degree that a child of similar age would not have. In Dawson's mind, repression is what caused him to feel horrible recollections. He was nervous for his family as a result of those upsetting recollections, and this anxiety has an impact on his life in general and Dawson's behaviour in particular (Pedneault, 2019:91).

## 2.2. The Impact of borderline personality disorder in Dawson Cole

Every aspect of life can be impacted by borderline personality disorder. Intense emotional pain and emotions of emptiness, desperation, rage, hopelessness, and loneliness are prominent characteristics of borderline personality disorder. It has some significant effects on relationships, employment, education, the law, and physical health (Pedneault, 2019). Using information from the novel, the researcher demonstrated how Dawson Cole's borderline personality disorder affected his relationships, legal situation, and physical health.

## 2.2.1. Relationships

Relationships are impacted by borderline personality disorder, as was already established. It encompasses connections with friends, family, and even romantic partners. Conflict and disagreements with family members or other friends are some ways that borderline personality disorder affects relationships (Pedneault,2019:82). The following tale illustrates it:

'They argued as well, and that's when Dawson first noticed her fiery personality. The surprising thing was that no matter how rapidly things erupted, they almost always ended equally quickly. Their arguments weren't regular, but they weren't infrequent either. There were times when they would argue vehemently for a while over trivial issues—Amanda was never one to hold back her opinions—and their arguments would frequently end in a deadlock. Even when he was sincerely angry, he couldn't help but admire her candour, which was born from the fact that she cared for him more than anybody else in his life. (p.20)"

The author demonstrated that Dawson and Amanda were fighting. He noticed that she had a burning temperament in her soul throughout this heated exchange. Whatever they did, they virtually always put an end to things quickly when it flared up. It's because their disagreements were infrequent and not always present. But occasionally, they would argue vehemently about trivial issues for a while without coming to a compromise. Even when he was genuinely furious in some instances, he could not help but admire her sincerity. She was the one who cared more about his life, as seen by her candour. Amanda had more opinions at this time than Dawson did. Because of the challenging emotion he had during arguments with his loved ones. He senses the internal struggle between his emotions and reason when he has to debate with her. He was disputing with her because of the conflicting emotions in his heart and intellect. (Sabarini,2018:45).

#### 2.2.2. Law

Dawson's experience with the law has also been impacted by borderline personality disorder. This is so that hostility and impulsive behaviour won't result from the rage that comes with borderline personality disorder. Aggression is a mood that results from rage and includes actions like assault, object throwing, and damage to other people's property. Additionally, it exhibits impulsive behaviour that includes reckless driving, substance misuse, stealing, and other criminal activity (Pedneault, 2019:77). The following examples from the author illustrate how borderline personality disorder affects the law:

"Marilyn was informed that the truck belonged to Tuck Hostetler. The driver, who would shortly be charged with vehicular homicide and manslaughter, was eighteen years old and was already in handcuffs. He was known as Dawson Cole." (p.48)"

This remark described Dr. Bonner, an Oriental city physician who was involved in an accident. The occurrence occurred on September 18, 1985. He left the house and began his thirty-minute journey along his customary route. Meanwhile, the night Dr. Bonner's accident occurred prevented him from ever returning home again. Marilyn, the wife of Dr. Bonner, discovered that the truck belonged to Tuck Hostler, the town's most renowned collector of various trucks. Consequently, the driver would be charged with vehicular homicide and manslaughter shortly. Dawson Cole, who was 18 years old at the time, was the driver and was already handcuffed.

## 2.2.3. Physical Health

Physical health is the final consequence of Dawson Cole's Borderline Personality Disorder. It is related with an unhealthy lifestyle such as smoking, drinking, and lack of exercise (Pedneault, 2019). The author demonstrated it in the following narration:

"Everything ached in the mornings, especially his back and shoulders. He wondered how many more years he could continue working on the rig; his body had endured a great deal of wear and strain, and each year seemed to exacerbate his injuries (p.92)

It was the time of day when everything ached for Dawson, especially his back and shoulders. After his release from prison, he worked on the rig for several years. He pondered how much longer he could continue working at the company. For Dawson, it seems like he accrued new injuries with each passing year. It is due to his unhealthy lifestyle when he was employed.

#### 2.3. Combating Borderline Personality Disorder: The Effort

"The Best of Me" is a feel-good story that celebrates romance, family, and friendship. On the other hand, it's a novel that tackles some serious issues, including domestic violence, bipolar disorder, and borderline personality disorder.

Borderline Personality Disorder (BPD) is a mental health condition that is characterized by chronic, intense, and unstable emotions. This can make everyday tasks like going to work or making friends extremely difficult. In addition, Dawson finds that the sounds of nature are consistently calming in all circumstances and are particularly effective at unwinding his spirit and mind. Both the morning and the evening have their own sounds. The early morning sound of chirping floating from the woods. The sounds of frogs and insects occasionally synced their beat in the evening. Typically, he can feel calm in the circumstance. But these days, he was reminded of home by such sounds. When that occurred, he would go back inside the house and try to erase the memories.

The following narrative lists the additional exercises for grounding in sight and sound:

'As he arrived in Oriental's compact downtown, the street was peaceful. In addition to passing two antique shops, a hardware store, and a few real estate offices, he also passed Irvin's Diner, which was already open and had a few automobiles parked in front of it, on the other side of the street.
